this volume focuses on analytic methods as alternatives to traditional public policy decision making methods covers a broad spectrum of analytic aids to decision making focuses on the needs of the users rather than the interests of analysts demonstrates that analysis is not limited to questions that can be quantified and provides information both practical and theoretical on questions that are important to those who need analytical help and to those responsible for sponsoring evaluating and implementing the analyses of others for decision makers in the public sector 1989

ethics is often spoken of in the public service as a rulebook something to consult when trouble arises or a set of prohibitions to avoid punishment yet for public managers ethics is

far more than compliance it is a daily practice of judgment exercised under pressure ambiguity limited resources and competing expectations every approval signed instruction given silence maintained or objection raised carries ethical weight whether or not it ever becomes the subject of an audit or investigation in the philippine public sector ethical decision making is shaped not only by laws and formal codes but also by deeply rooted social realities concepts such as utang na loob pakikisama respect for hierarchy political accommodation and gift giving cultures intersect with modern governance demands for transparency fairness and accountability these intersections often produce not clear violations but difficult dilemmas situations where the right action is not immediately obvious and where personal professional and institutional values collide many public managers are not unethical they are unprepared for these grey areas this book is written for those managers it is designed for public administrators school heads supervisors department chiefs and emerging leaders who want to act with integrity without becoming naïve rigid or paralyzed by fear rather than treating ethics as abstract philosophy or legal technicalities this book approaches ethics as a practical managerial competence one that can be learned strengthened and institutionalized the chapters move deliberately from foundations to practice the opening sections clarify key distinctions among ethics morality law and policy grounding the idea of public office as a public trust exercised in everyday decisions core ethical frameworks are then introduced not as academic debates but as tools for thinking helping managers reason through consequences duties character and fairness philippine laws codes and oversight institutions are discussed in terms of what managers actually need to know what to document when to seek guidance and how to act without paranoia or defensiveness at the heart of the book are real administrative dilemmas gifts and favors hiring pressure conflicts of interest confidential information procurement decisions and frontline service challenges these are paired with step by step decision making tools practical tests and documentation practices that help managers decide explain and defend ethical choices the later chapters extend ethics into core management functions human resources budgeting procurement partnerships communication and digital systems recognizing that ethics is embedded in systems not isolated acts finally the book turns to leadership and organizational culture ethical behavior cannot survive on individual heroism

alone it requires integrity systems safe reporting channels fair grievance mechanisms and leaders who protect ethical staff rather than leaving them exposed the closing chapter offers a practice playbook for ethical leadership in the philippine context emphasizing consistency courage and the power of small daily decisions to shape institutional norms this book does not promise easy answers ethical public management rarely offers them what it offers instead is a disciplined way of seeing reasoning deciding and acting so that public managers can serve with competence fairness and moral confidence even when the path forward is difficult in a time when public trust is fragile and expectations are high ethical leadership is no longer optional it is a core responsibility of anyone entrusted with public authority

education does not operate in isolation schools are embedded in communities shaped by public institutions local cultures political realities and the everyday decisions of leaders who must balance ideals with constraints in the philippines where decentralization diversity and inequality coexist educational outcomes are closely linked to governance quality and community development strength this book begins from a simple but demanding premise better learning and social outcomes require better decisions decisions grounded in evidence guided by integrity and made with communities rather than for them educational governance and community development evidence based decision making for public and school leadership is written for school heads supervisors division and regional leaders lgu education focal persons and development practitioners who work at the intersection of education and local governance it is also intended for graduate students and emerging leaders who seek to understand not only what policies say but how governance actually works on the ground the book responds to a recurring gap in practice while leaders are expected to plan implement and account for results they are often given fragmented tools compliance heavy guidance or abstract theories that are difficult to apply in real philippine settings this volume bridges the gap by integrating three domains often treated separately educational governance community development and evidence use governance is approached not merely as administration or control but as a set of ethical and relational practices that shape trust accountability and participation community development is a core responsibility of education leaders who recognize schools as local hubs that influence health livelihoods peace and social cohesion evidence in turn is treated pragmatically not as perfect

data or complex research designs but as good enough information that can responsibly inform decisions at different levels the chapters are deliberately structured to follow the real decision making cycle leaders face the book begins with foundational concepts of governance in the philippine context clarifying roles principles and ethical obligations it then situates education within decentralization policy and accountability systems that shape what leaders can and cannot do from there the discussion expands to community development emphasizing context inclusion and trust building subsequent chapters focus on evidence ecosystems diagnostics planning implementation and monitoring always with attention to feasibility equity and integrity the final chapter consolidates learning through case models tools and templates that leaders can adapt to their own contexts throughout the book emphasis is placed on practical judgment rather than rigid formulas leaders are encouraged to ask critical questions such as whose voices are missing what data are sufficient for this decision who benefits and who may be left behind how can accountability be strengthened without undermining learning and innovation by engaging these questions the book aims to cultivate evidence discipline not technocracy professionalism not detachment and responsiveness not short term compliance ultimately this book is an invitation to lead differently it calls on education and public leaders to see governance as a moral and developmental practice to treat communities as partners and to use evidence as a tool for learning and improvement rather than mere reporting in doing so it hopes to contribute however modestly to schools and communities that are more inclusive resilient and capable of delivering meaningful outcomes for filipino learners and citizens

federal agencies have taken steps to include the public in a wide range of environmental decisions although some form of public participation is often required by law agencies usually have broad discretion about the extent of that involvement approaches vary widely from holding public information gathering meetings to forming advisory groups to actively including citizens in making and implementing decisions proponents of public participation argue that those who must live with the outcome of an environmental decision should have some influence on it critics maintain that public participation slows decision making and can lower its quality by including people unfamiliar with the science involved this book concludes that when done correctly public participation improves the quality of federal

agencies decisions about the environment well managed public involvement also increases the legitimacy of decisions in the eyes of those affected by them which makes it more likely that the decisions will be implemented effectively this book recommends that agencies recognize public participation as valuable to their objectives not just as a formality required by the law it details principles and approaches agencies can use to successfully involve the public

to understand public policy decisions it is imperative to understand the capacities of the individual actors who are making them how they think and feel about their role and what drives and motivates them however the current literature takes little account of this preferring instead to frame the decisions as the outcomes of a rational search for value maximising alternatives or the result of systematic and well ordered institutional and organisational processes yet understanding how personal and emotional factors interact with broader institutional and organisational influences to shape the deliberations and behaviour of politicians and bureaucrats is paramount if we are to construct a more useful nuanced and dynamic picture of government decision making this book draws on a variety of approaches to examine individuals working in contemporary government from freshly trained policy officers to former cabinet ministers and prime ministers it provides important new insights into how those in government navigate their way through complex issues and decisions based on developed expertise that fuses formal rational techniques with other learned behaviours memories emotions and practiced forms of judgment at an individual level this innovative collection from leading academics across australia europe the united kingdom and north america will be of great interest to researchers educators advanced students and practitioners working in the fields of political science public management and administration and public policy
